

## **ALFLAFA**

After a slight bump up in alfalfa price at the first of the month, hay prices settled down and remained steady for the rest of the month. Alfalfa fields grew rapidly with warm and sunny days, but producers battled weevil and aphids, some of whom have sprayed twice already. A cold snap at the end of the month brought snow and below freezing low temperatures. Producers are assessing any damage that may have occurred and anticipate a bit of a setback on first cutting.





Total tons of grinding alfalfa sold in the southwest region so far for 2021 was 142,125 tons, down 18,873 tons or 12% from 2020 (includes ground and delivered).





Tons of grinding alfalfa sold in the south-central region was 126,474 tons, up 33,670 tons or 36% from 2020.

A wide discrepancy in price between the southwest and south-central regions for alfalfa continues so far this year, which was created in 2020 by the extremely dry weather conditions. Southwest and South Central 2021 grinding hay and ground and delivered alfalfa are also higher than a year ago. South Central grinding alfalfa in the bale is currently up \$55.00 while ground and delivered is up \$25.00 while Southwest grinding hay in the bale is currently \$55.00 higher and ground and delivered is \$55.00 higher than a year ago.













## **GRASS HAY**


Grass hay fields are greening up nicely and cattle will be turned out soon if they have not been moved already. Movement and demand have slowed as cattle move to grass; however, March and April 2021 saw more grass hay usage than 2020. Overall, total grass hay traded in 2021 trails the previous year by 254 tons.





Price of grass hay is trending down, except for small squares which remain steady. Carryover grass hay is expected. Prairie hay prices have been lower in 2021 than the previous year for small squares and mid squares. However, large squares and large rounds have been running, on average \$5.00 higher.





On average, prairie hay remained down \$8.00 for small squares, is up \$9.00 for mid squares, is up \$5.00 for large squares and up \$5.00 for large rounds.
